- OStarted growing faster in late 90s with positive health benefits of NABC research and Dr. Joseph
- Marketers started looking for 12 month programs to take to stores
- •Merged with Chilean production for winter program

- ○1993 61 acres
- o1996 overhead irrigation to Rabbiteyes, planted Highbush
- Jerry Vanderwagen



South Georgia

- o1990's money tight, short lenders
- oEarly 2000's Highbush & Rabbiteye doing well
- ○2003 2006 3 years interest only loans
- o2006 Cornelius Blueberry Farm divided
- o2007 − Hard freeze Easter morning
- o2008 good crop recovery, cheap process market

Continued Growth



- Continued market growth due to increasing consumer demand
- 2012 McDonald's has fresh blueberries (RTE – ready to eat)
- Grocers are consolidating more and more every year


Reasons for planting

- Natural to our soil & climate
- Pine trees for bark used for soil amendment
- •Natural pH is 4.2 5
- Fields are successfully converted for Highbush & Rabbiteye



Land Prep

- Traditional stumping & hauling off
- You don't want to burn stumps
- Be very careful with this
- Grinding method began in early 2000's



CLEARING

- After clearing comes harrowing
- Don't move too much topsoil
- Use GPS to lay off rows
- Eyeballing is okay
- Not sure for here and washing away of soils
- Row space
 - Highbush 9-11 feet
 - Rabbiteye 10-12 feet
- If hard pan recommend to subsoil under bed

Irrigation

- **Drip** for daily watering and fertigation injection
- OUse qualified Irrigation when available
- Overhead if funds available, cheaper now than later
- o.25-30tenths is what we do
- Some as high as .50 inch
- North Carolina .15inch
- Orip tape or tube



Planting



- Order plants 2 years ago
- Reputable & licensed company
- Royalties are collected on many varieties
- Royalties are a good thing to keep more coming

Highbush vs Rabbiteye

- •Blooms early high chance of frost
- Low chance of machine harvest due to being less firm
- Pruning is more critical
- Ripen early
- Generally larger berry size
- Most are self-fruiting whereas rabbiteye varieties are not
- Typical smoother textured berry
- "Southern Highbush is a plant looking for a place to die" – Gerard Krewer

- Blooms later than HB
- More Hardy
- Higher chance of machine harvest more firm
- More vigorous plants
- Grow better on upland soils; require less organic matter
- More heat and drought tolerant
- More suitable for long distant shipping

Highbush Varieties from Cornelius Farms

- oCamellia early mid season, large berry, strong color
- oEmerald vigorous bush, high yield, early, large & firm, sweet flavor
- oRebel early ripening, good berry size
- Suziblue Excellent productivity, large size, firm, main season variety
- OSweetcrisp high vigorous, survivable, unusually firm, crisp, sweet
- Star Large berry, good for long-distance shipping, harvested rapidly
- oFarthing Vigorous, heavy flowers, extended crop period
- oMeadowlark ripens early, potential machine harvest, mild flavor
- Kestrel ripens early, sweet, plump & firm, picks well

Rabbiteye Varieties from Cornelius Farms

- OAlapaha vigorous, narrow crowns, late flower, high yields, very firm
- Austin- very early, good quality, high production
- Brightwell one of top varieties in world
- oPowder Blue excellent hybrid, powdery blush, excellent quality
- oPremier large, ripens early, ideal for fresh commercial markets
- Vernon early season, large, good yields, excellent firmness
- Ochlocknee ripens late, superior berry size, high quality, vigorous
- Prince very productive & vigorous, coastal region due to early bloom
- Titan good shelf life, very large & successful



Cornelius Farm Nursery Division

- 1989 no good quality plants, started growing our own
- Sold excess to neighbors after planting
- Took on new orders in addition to our own plant needs

- •2012 hired Nathan Baldree as nursery manager
- •2014 started up website, www.corneliusfarms.com
